

The Great Commandment



What is a Covenant?



Q. What is meant by a covenant with God?

A. A covenant is a relationship initiated by God, to which a body of people responds in faith. -An Outline of the Faith, BCP p. 846

In the Old Testament the Hebrew word for covenant is be'rith and in the New Testament it is the Greek word diatheke. A covenant is a bonded relationship between two or more parties. God has initiated many covenants with different people throughout biblical history.

The 6 Biblical Covenants

There is a flow to the covenants found in the Bible. The manifestation of God's covenants occurs in a sequence:

- Adam (Gen. 1:26-28; 2:15-17)
 - o Promised blessings: The Tree of Life & Freedom in Eden
 - o Stipulations: Reflect, Reproduce and Reign & Do not eat the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil
 - o Curses: Toil, Pain and Death
 - Signs: Trees, the Animal Skin Coverings
 - Promise of Restoration (Gen. 3:15)

"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her seed; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel."

- -Genesis 3:15 (ESV)
 - Noah (Gen. 9:12-16)
 - Promise: Global Stability in spite of the sinful heart of Man (no more global

 - o Sign: Bow in the Clouds, Ark through the Water (Gen. 9:13)

Acts 2:⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵ They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

Early Christian Practice:

"And on the day called Sunday, all who live in cities or in the country gather together to one place, and the memoirs of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as time permits; then, when the reader has ceased, the president verbally instructs, and exhorts to the imitation of these good things. Then we all rise together and pray, and, as we before said, when our prayer is ended, bread and wine and water are brought, and the president in like manner offers prayers and thanksgivings, according to his ability, and the people assent, saying Amen; and there is a distribution to each, and a participation of that over which thanks have been given, and to those who are absent a portion is sent by the deacons."

--Justin Martyr's Apology (150 A.D.)

Sunday Worship

Liturgy

¹ a form or formulary according to which public religious worship, especially Christian worship, is conducted.

² a religious service conducted according to a liturgy: at the conclusion of the liturgy the Bishop presented the certificates

Origin: mid 16th century: via French or late Latin from Greek *leitourgia* 'public service, worship of the gods', from *leito-* "public" (from *laos* "people")+ -*ergos* "that works," from *ergon* "work".





Every Church is liturgical, and has a liturgy.

Key Learning: While some may consider the Episcopal Church uniquely a "liturgical" church, there really is no such thing as a "non-liturgical" church. The difference is in prayer style and formality, music and structure. To sing a few songs, say some extemporaneous prayers, take an offering, preach a sermon and have an altar call is a type of "liturgy". However, what most people mean when they use the word "liturgical" is that the order follows a more formalized format with written prayers and fixed structure.

Where do we find the Episcopal Church's liturgy?

The Book of Common Prayer contains the liturgies for usage in the Episcopal Church. We find our principle (or main) liturgy beginning on page 355 of the Book of Common Prayer.

"The Holy Eucharist, the principle act of Christian worship on the Lord's Day and other major feasts, and Daily Morning and Evening Prayer, as set forth in this Book, are the regular services appointed for public worship in this Church." BCP p. 13

Extemporaneous prayer is spontaneous and usually non-formulaic verbal praise, confession, thanksgiving, and/or petition that we offer to God in silence or out loud.



Living as a Romans 12 Christian

A Living Sacrifice

Romans 12 Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. ² Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is —his good, pleasing and perfect will.

Humble Service in the Body of Christ

³ For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the faith God has distributed to each of you. ⁴ For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, ⁵ so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. ⁶ We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your^[a] faith; ⁷ if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; ⁸ if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, ^[b] do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully.

Love in Action

⁹ Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. ¹⁰ Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves. ¹¹ Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. ¹² Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. ¹³ Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality.

¹⁴ Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse. ¹⁵ Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. ¹⁶ Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position. ^[c] Do not be conceited.

¹⁷ Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everyone. ¹⁸ If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. ¹⁹ Do not take revenge, my dear friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: "It is mine to avenge; I will repay," ^[d] says the Lord. ²⁰ On the contrary:

"If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head." [2]

Unity in the Body & Biblical Peacemaking

The Bible provides us with a simple yet powerful system for resolving conflict. These principles are so simple that they can be used to resolve the most basic or the most complex conflicts of daily life.

To gain a basic understanding of this system for biblical peacemaking, we will study the following foundational principles:

Getting to the Heart of Conflict - Conflict starts in the heart. Therefore, if we fail to address the heart in a conflict, then any solution will fall short of true reconciliation.

The Four G's - The biblical system for resolving conflict is captured by "The Four G's": Glorify God, Get the log out of your own eye, Gently Restore, and Go and be reconciled.

The Slippery Slope - A visual tool for understanding the ways people tend to and ought to respond to conflict.

The Seven A's of Confession - A guide to making a sincere and complete confession.

The Four Promises of Forgiveness - A great way to remember what you are really saying (and committing to) when you say "I forgive you."

The PAUSE Principle - A biblical approach to negotiation.

Assisted Peacemaking – Mediation, Arbitration and Accountability

The Peacemaker's Pledge – A complete summary of biblical peacemaking.

Relational Commitments - A way for a church to make a mutual commitment to work together to pursue unity, maintain friendships, preserve marriages, and build relationships that reflect the love of Christ.

The Gospel of Peace Mirrored Through Peacemaking - A summary statement of how the gospel of Jesus Christ is at the core of biblical peacemaking.



Session 6 – Discipleship I: The Christian Faith: What do we believe?

Watch your life and doctrine closely. Persevere in them, because if you do, you will save both yourself and your hearers. 1 Timothy 4:16

Doctrine shall mean the basic and essential teachings of the Church and is to be found in the Canon of Holy Scripture as understood in the Apostles and Nicene Creeds and in the sacramental rites, the Ordinal and Catechism of the Book of Common Prayer. (The Constitutions and Canons of the Episcopal Church, Canon IV.2, p. 132)

The Holy Scriptures

What do the Scriptures say about themselves?

2 Timothy 3:¹⁴ But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it, ¹⁵ and how from infancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶ All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, ¹⁷ so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.



2 Peter 1:²⁰ Above all, you must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation of things. ²¹ For prophecy never had its origin in the human will, but prophets, though human, spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.

What does the Episcopal Church say about the Scriptures?

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen. (BCP, 236)*

The Holy Spirit (from the Catechism, BCP, 852-853)

- Q. What is the Holy Spirit?
- A. The Holy Spirit is the Third Person of the Trinity, God at work in the world and in the Church even now.






- Q. How is the Holy Spirit revealed in the Old Covenant?
- A. The Holy Spirit is revealed in the Old Covenant as the giver of life, the One who spoke through the prophets.
- Q. How is the Holy Spirit revealed in the New Covenant?
- A. The Holy Spirit is revealed as the Lord who leads us into all truth and enables us to grow in the likeness of Christ.
- Q. How do we recognize the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives?
- A. We recognize the presence of the Holy Spirit when we confess Jesus Christ as Lord and are brought into love and harmony with God, with ourselves, with our neighbors, and with all creation.
- Q. How do we recognize the truths taught by the Holy Spirit?
- A. We recognize truths to be taught by the Holy Spirit when they are in accord with the Scriptures.

The Holy Scriptures

- Q. What are the Holy Scriptures?
- A. The Holy Scriptures, commonly called the Bible, are the books of the Old and New Testaments; other books, called the Apocrypha, are often included in the Bible.
- Q. What is the Old Testament?
- A. The Old Testament consists of books written by the people of the Old Covenant, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, to show God at work in nature and history.
- Q. What is the New Testament?
- A. The New Testament consists of books written by the people of the New Covenant, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, to set forth the life and teachings of Jesus and to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom for all people.
- Q. What is the Apocrypha?
- A. The Apocrypha is a collection of additional books written by people of the Old Covenant, and used in the Christian Church.
- Q. Why do we call the Holy Scriptures the Word of God?

- Q. What are the creeds?
- A. The creeds are statements of our basic beliefs about God.
- Q. How many creeds does this Church use in its worship?
- A. This Church uses two creeds: The Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed.
- Q. What is the Apostles' Creed?
- A. The Apostles' Creed is the ancient creed of Baptism; it is used in the Church's daily worship to recall our Baptismal Covenant.
- Q. What is the Nicene Creed?
- A. The Nicene Creed is the creed of the universal Church and is used at the Eucharist.
- Q. What, then, is the Athanasian Creed?
- A. The Athanasian Creed is an ancient document proclaiming the nature of the Incarnation and of God as Trinity.
- Q. What is the Trinity?
- A. The Trinity is one God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

- Q. What are the sacraments?
- A. The sacraments are outward and visible signs of inward and spiritual grace, given by Christ as sure and certain means by which we receive that grace.

Fruits of the Spirit

Galatians 5:¹⁶ So I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷ For the flesh desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the flesh. They are in conflict with each other, so that you are not to do whatever^[c] you want. ¹⁸ But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under the law.

¹⁹ The *acts of the flesh* are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; ²⁰ idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions ²¹ and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God.

²² But the *fruit of the Spirit* is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. ²⁴ Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. ²⁶ Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other.

2 Peter 1:³ His divine power has given us everything we need for *a godly life* through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. ⁴ Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature, having escaped the corruption in the world caused by evil desires.

⁵ For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; ⁶ and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; ⁷ and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love. ⁸ For if you possess these *qualities* in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹ But whoever does not have them is nearsighted and blind, forgetting that they have been cleansed from their past sins.

¹⁰ Therefore, my brothers and sisters, make every effort to confirm your calling and election. For if you *do these things*, you will never stumble, ¹¹ and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

"Thank you for making me so wonderfully complex! It is amazing to think about. Your workmanship is marvelous . . . You were there while I was being formed. . . . You saw me before I was born and scheduled each day of my life before I began to breathe." Psalm 139:14-16 (Living Bible)

Purpose of Spiritual Gifts

A spiritual gift is a special ability, given by the Holy Spirit to every believer at their conversion, to be used to minister to others and therefore build up the Body of Christ.

- Not for my benefit, but for others: 1 Peter 4:10; 1 Corinthians 12:7
- To produce unity and maturity in our church family: Ephesians 4:11, 13, 14
- Three ways God wants you to use your gifts:
 - o Through an on-going ministry
 - Through short-term projects
 - o Through spontaneous situations





What the Bible Says about Spiritual Gifts

- Only believers have spiritual gifts: 1 Corinthians 2:14.
- Every Christian has at least one gift: 1 Corinthians 7:7.
- No one receives all the gifts: 1 Corinthians 12:27-30.
- No single gift is given to everyone: 1 Corinthians 12:29, 30.
- You can't earn a spiritual gift: Ephesians 4:7.
- The Holy Spirit decides what gifts I get: 1 Corinthians 12:11.
- The gifts I'm given are permanent: Romans 11:29.
- I am to develop the gifts God gives me: 1 Timothy 4:14.
- It's a sin to waste the gifts God gives me: 1 Corinthians 4:1, 2 and Matthew 25:14-30.
- Using my gifts glorifies God and edifies/"grows" me: John 15:8.

My S.H.A.P.E.

Spiritual Gifts - your special ability, given by the Holy Spirit to every believer, to be used to minister to others and therefore build up the Body of Christ. Spiritual gifts reveal part of God's will for your ministry, but not all of it. If you would like to know more about your Spiritual Gifts, ask others, take a Spiritual Gifts Test.

Key: Identify the gifts God has given you. Romans 12:3-8; 1 Corinthians 12:1-11, 27-31; Ephesians 4:11, 12; 1 Peter 4:9-11.

Heart (Passions) - represents your desires, interests and inclinations. Your heart determines why you say the things you do (Matt. 12:34), why you feel the way you do (Psalm 34:7), and why you act the way you do (Proverbs 4:23). There are certain things you feel passionate about and others turn you off. God has a purpose in giving you your inborn interests; don't ignore them! They will help you be fruitful in ministry.

Key: Clarify what you really love to do. Philippians 2:13; Revelation 17:7.

Abilities - These are the natural talents, skills and abilities that you were born with and have acquired during your life. Exodus 31:3 tells us that God gives people "skill, ability, and knowledge in all kinds of crafts..." in order to accomplish His purposes.

Key: Appreciate and apply the natural talents and vocational skills you have to your ministry. Exodus 31:3; 1 Corinthians 12:6; 2 Corinthians 3:5b

Personality - We need all kinds of personalities to accomplish God's will. Your personality will affect how and where you use your spiritual gifts and abilities. For instance, two people may have the same gift, but if one is introverted and the other is extroverted, that gift will be expressed in different ways. To learn more about your "personality type", take a Personality I.D. Assessment like Myers-Briggs or DISC.

Key: Learn how your God-given temperament can best be used in ministry. 1 Corinthians 2:11



Experience - "And we know that in alll things God works for the good of those who Confirmation Class have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28). All experiences - good, bad, educational, work related, volunteer, church, secular - help make us who we are.

Key: Review your history to discover how God has prepared you for a unique ministry that only you can fulfill! Proverbs 4:13; 2 Corinthians 1:4; Hebrews 5:12, 13

Cautions about Spiritual Gifts

- Don't confuse gifts with natural talents (abilities).
- Don't confuse gifts with the Fruit of the Spirit: fruit shows my maturity; gifts show my ministry. Galatians 5:22, 23.
- Don't confuse gifts with Christian roles.
- Be aware of gift projection: expecting others to serve the way I do and have similar results.
- Don't feel my gift makes me superior to others. <u>1 Corinthians 12:21</u>.
- Realize that using my gift without love is worthless! 1 Corinthians 13:1-3.
- Recognize that I have a primary and secondary ministry in my church: primary ministry should be in the area I am gifted; secondary includes serving in any other area of the Body when I am needed.

Discover Your SHAPE for Ministry



S.H.A.P.E. is an acronym that helps explain the five elements that determine what a person's ministry should be. To a great extent, your SHAPE effects how you think, motivate, play, work, minister, interact with others and even how you live.

When we have some understanding about our SHAPE, we begin to see why some tasks, challenges, and even people are a natural fit for us and yet others are a struggle.

Your SHAPE is made up of your:

SPIRITUAL GIFTS - your special ability, given by the Holy Spirit to every believer, to be used to minister to others and therefore build up the Body of Christ. Spiritual gifts reveal part of God's will for your ministry, but not all of it. If you would like to know more about your Spiritual Gift, take the Spiritual Gift Analysis.

HEART (passions) - represents your desires, interests and inclinations. Your heart determines why you say the things you do (Matt. 12:34), why you feel the way you do (Psalm 34:7), and why you act the way you do (Proverbs 4:23). There are certain things you feel passionate about and others turn you off. God has a purpose in giving you your inborn interests; don't ignore them! They will help you be fruitful in ministry.

ABILITIES - These are the natural talents, skills and abilities that you were born with and have acquired during your life. Exodus 31:3 tells us that God gives people "skill, ability, and knowledge in all kinds of crafts..." in order to accomplish His purposes.

PERSONALITY - We need all kinds of personalities to accomplish God's will. Your personality will affect how and where you use your spiritual gifts and abilities. EXPERIENCES - "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28). All experiences - good, bad, educational, work related, volunteer, church, secular - help make us who we are. Now that I know my SHAPE, where do I go from here?

Every believer is uniquely SHAPEd for a particular ministry. Knowing your SHAPE will help you determine what type of Ministry God wants you to serve in. No matter what your personal or professional "calling", God has called you to develop your personal Mission, and, by His power, to walk out your Vision in today's world. When you minister in a manner consistent with your heart, personality, gifts and abilities God gave you, you experience fulfillment, satisfaction and fruitfulness.

God deserves your best. He SHAPEd you for a purpose, and He expects you to make the most of what you have been given! Don't let another day go by. Find out today what God intends for you to be and do! Once you understand your God-given SHAPE, don't keep it a secret!

Share your SHAPE with your church family and begin experiencing fulfillment, satisfaction and fruitfulness in serving God and others!

Salt and Light: Matthew 5:13-16

¹³ "You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot.

¹⁴ "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵ Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. ¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.

What does it mean to be Salt and Light?

was a stranger and you invited me in, ³⁶ I needed clothes and you clothed me, I Confirmation Clas looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

- ³⁷ "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? ³⁸ When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? ³⁹ When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'
- ⁴⁰ "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'
- ⁴¹ "Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. ⁴² For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, ⁴³ I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.'
- ⁴⁴ "They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?'
- ⁴⁵ "He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.'
- ⁴⁶ "Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

Will you seek and serve Christ in all people loving your neighbor as yourself?
